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UQ Gatton now with world-class Science Centre

Excitement is stirring at the UQ Gatton campus with the official opening of the Centre for Advanced Animal Science (CAAS) a joint venture between The University of Queensland and the Department of Primary Industries and Fisheries.

It was a VIP event with the Queensland Minister for Primary Industries and Fisheries, the Honorable Tim

Mulherin, officially opening the \$33 million Centre for Advanced Animal Science at The University of Queensland Gatton Campus.

Attendees were then taken on guided tours though the centre where they were able to see the world class facilities which included biosecurity containment rooms for disease and vaccine research, grouped and individual animal pens for nutrition trials, feed processing shed and cattle handling yards.

Professor Roger Swift, Executive Dean of the Faculty of Natural Resources, Agriculture and Veterinary Science, said CAAS research had the potential to impact the agricultural industry in Australia, and internationally.

"With the issue of global food shortages now becoming a key topic, CAAS will allow researchers to look into ways of increasing the quantity and quality

of food using sustainable practices, particularly in tropical environments," Professor Swift said.

"I'm pleased that this new Centre will encourage university and government researchers to collaborate on high-profile projects which will be of direct benefit to our primary producers, and will ensure Queensland's continued economic development and growth.

"I would particularly like to acknowledge S2F, the CAAS architects, as well as McNab Constructions and local subcontractors, who did an excellent job on such a complex and highly technical project."

The true excitement is in the future research projects that will look into ways to reduce greenhouse emissions in livestock, ensure greater beef supply through a tick vaccine and improve biosecurity all at UQ Gatton.

We have pointed this problem out to senior management of UO Gatton but agricultural education continues to be offered at both St Lucia and Gatton campuses. If you have the opportunity, you may like to let UQ management know that all agricultural education should be centred at UQ Gatton. The School of Veterinary Science will be based at UQ Gatton from 2010 and we extend a hearty welcome to them.

If we don't see you at the Back to College Weekend, then on behalf of the management committee, I wish you and your family all the best for the Festive Season.

Birth of a College Icon – Part 2

The creation of a new UQGPSA badge/logo

Part two and conclusion to the saga commenced in Winter edition of Re-Connect. Visit **www.uq.edu.au**/ **gatton/paststudents** to view Part 1.

Numerous versions of the PSA badge and the old College badge, and the various shapes and colour combinations, of which a surprising number existed, were reviewed.

It was finally decided that the general scalloped outer shape of the previous PSA badge which has proved popular, would be retained. However, internally the general arrangement of the old College badge, (not PSA badge) would be adopted, with the maroon coloured Maltese Cross predominating with the black and gold oval shaped letter "Q" replacing the circle in the old badge. The plough in the old badge would be replaced with the white open book on a blue background which is the centrepiece of The University of Queensland logo. Due to the oval shape of the "Q", the two maces which lie behind the white book in The University of Queensland badge were omitted.

It was universally agreed that the domineering nature of the wheat sheaves between the four limbs of the maltese cross should be attenuated so that they became background rather than foreground.

Attention then turned to what should occupy the various limbs of the maltese cross. Initially only the north and south limbs were to be occupied with the letters "UQG" in the north limb and "PSA" in the south limb.

In true democratic fashion, prototypes were put on display for members to comment upon. The artist, yours truly, anticipated general all round admiring murmurs and was discomforted to discover that there was some dichotomy of opinion on the merits of his enfant terrible. Of particular concern was the



oft repeated view that with the removal of the plough from the badge, all symbols agricultural had been divested and therefore was not representative of the agricultural base of the Institution. Yours truly retreated into his cave and brooded over the metaphorical rebuke.

The experimental inclusion of the old plough in the west limb and a Bos indicus bull in the east limb proved symbolically and visually pleasing and the fact that the featured bull, taken from a photo on the front cover of the 1962 College Magazine, was no other than the famed and iconic "Cherokee Little Chief" who created no end of attention during his time at College, completed the symbolic coup.

The time had now come to present the amended and improved version to a test audience, accompanied by soft, menacing, implied threats of unpleasant consequences if this wasn't approved of or if any further modifications were suggested or required. By now everyone concerned was probably thoroughly exhausted by the process and quickly acquiesced. With that approval in hand, labour was "induced" (to revert to the previous analogy), and a sturdy youngster was delivered uneventfully, took his first breaths and made his first screaming announcement to the world. (All involved doing well!!!).

And that's the true story of how the new UQPSA badge/logo came about. All will now live happily ever after.

Congratulations Miss Ong – 2008 Scholarship Recipient



Congratulations to Miss Hwee Teen Diana Ong (shown here accepting the scholarship from President, Mr Graham McClymont), recipient of the UQ Gatton Past Students Association Scholarship for 2008. Miss Ong is an international student from Singapore and is studying for a Bachelor of Applied Science.

Recipients receive \$5,000 per year for the duration of their course. You can support the scholarship through contributions to a table or chair in the Dining Hall. Contact the secretariat for further information. Dr Allan Baker completed a Queensland Diploma in Animal Husbandry from the Queensland Agricultural College in 1956. He completed a Bachelor of Veterinary Science (Honours) in 1961 and a PhD in 1968, both from The University of Queensland.

Dr Baker was a Postdoctoral Fellow at Cambridge University from 1969 to 1970, and again in 1975, where he studied livestock embryo transfer and its application.

Also in 1975, he was awarded a French Government Scholarship to study potential agricultural, including veterinary, collaborations between Australia and France.

His work led to him introducing French cattle breeds to Australia the following year, and he was awarded the Agency Pour Cooperation Technique Industrielle Et Economique (ACTIM) Medal in 1975 from the French Government.

In 1982, Dr Baker received a Fellowship with the Australian College of Veterinarian Scientists.

Dr Baker has continued his involvement with UQ Gatton through lecturing appointments and casual academic positions. Between 1963 and 1967, he was Head Lecturer in Animal Science, before serving as a Senior Lecturer between 1970 and 1983. He was a Queensland Agricultural College Councillor between 1978 and 1983 and from 1985 until 1988, he was Director of UQ's Pastoral Veterinary Centre at Goondiwindi.

He also instructed at the UQ Gatton Dairy as a casual academic between 2002 and 2004.

He was a veterinary practitioner and owner of three veterinary practices between 1988 and 1999, in Allora and Cooroy, Queensland.

Dr Baker has worked extensively with developing countries under the auspices of aid agencies in countries such as Vanuatu, Fiji, Indonesia, Bangladesh and Nepal. He established laboratories and clinics and taught animal husbandry and veterinary science as well as training local livestock and agricultural officers.

Between 1983 and 1985, he was Head of the Livestock Division for the Ministry of Agriculture and Lands and Chief Veterinary Officer in the Soloman Islands.

His overseas work was recognised by the Australian College of Veterinary Science and the Australian Veterinary Association which awarded him the Kesteven Medal in 2005 for his contributions to international veterinary science.

In 2007 he was appointed the Queensland Department of Primary Industries and Fisheries' Operations Manager to deal with the equine influenza outbreak.

The Veterans

December 2007 marked the 60th year since students of the 1947 Diploma Courses completed their studies at College. Also the 50th anniversary of the establishment of the then Queensland Agricultural College & High School was celebrated in 1947.

Since those days, College has undergone changes in administration, courses, student numbers and it's physical appearance. It has also changed from those earlier days of boarding school discipline, interhouse sport and the value placed on practical work within the four courses available. The motto 'Science with Practice' has been replaced but it still forms the basis of the Past Students' Association badge.

During the past 60 years we saw the start of the three year Diploma, the cessation of the High School, the establishment of a College of Advanced Education and in 1990 the amalgamation with The University of Queensland. Interestingly, the College had association with the University since 1927 when the Faculty of Agriculture and Mr J.K. Murray, Principal, became the first Professor of Agriculture.

Those of you who will be present at the *Back to College Weekend* in 2008 and have not visited College since your graduation will be surprised at the physical appearance and the building program. A far cry from the Spartan days after the departure of the 105th Hospital of the United State Army in late 1944.

The following Diploma students from 1947 were at last years *Back to College Weekend*. Fred Arndt, Alan Boag, Ralph Epstein, John Fullerton, Luke Lazarides and Ray Montgomery. At past reunions the Veterans came from the 40 year (since graduation) group. To be now in the 60 year group is quite an achievement.

Although the numbers in 1947 were small, many were unable to attend because of distance, health reasons and unfortunately those who had passed away. Those of you present in 2008 should also spare a thought for your absent classmates.

Introducing ...



Margaret Reisenleiter Administrative Officer, UQ Gatton Past Students Association

I am the youngest (by a long way) in a family of six children, born Margaret Luck in Laidley to farming parents from Woodlands. I was an aunty five times over by the time I was born and grew up with my nieces and nephews being more like my siblings than my real siblings. When I was five my parents and I moved to Gatton, leaving the farm to my only brother and my sister who were the closest to me in age, being 20 and 19 respectively at that time. My education was done entirely with the Sisters of Mercy at Gatton Convent.

Upon leaving school, I commenced work at the Bank of New South Wales (now Westpac) in Gatton as secretary to the Manager for a few years before moving to the ledger section, where I quite happily worked the ledger machines, keeping track of people's finances for many years. I later became the first female country teller in Queensland for the Bank of NSW, a position I held for the next 5 years in what was then a very male dominated area. It was at this time that I married Glenn Reisenleiter, a farmer and stockman from the Mt Sylvia area outside Gatton. My association with the Gatton College started two weeks after we married when Glenn gained employment at the

Queensland Agricultural College as a stockman at Farm Square. I quite enjoyed accompanying him to the Exhibition, local shows, and stud sales.

When I finished working at the bank, I spent a number of years doing clerical work for a local electrical contracting firm before setting up my own bookkeeping and typing service. I bought a computer and printer and set about finding someone to write a bookkeeping program for me as there were none available on the market at that time. I taught myself to use the computer and invited some of the larger business firms in town to a viewing to show them how computers could assist them in their business. My closest support was a fellow I used to phone in Sydney. The business grew and I employed people to help me do the work.

During a particularly stressful period in my life, I wound down the business, keeping only a small number of clients, and spent 10 years doing administration work for a local mechanical business. I then decided to kick-start the business again and soon afterwards I was approached by Val Kilah, UQ Gatton Past Students Historical Collection volunteer, and one of my former clients and so began my time as administrative officer a few hours each week for the UQ Gatton Past Students Association, commencing in mid 2006.

I have thoroughly enjoyed working for the Association, being involved with the committee, renewing old acquaintances, and meeting members and graduates.

Campus Development Update

Vet School – The fences are up and the builders are on campus to begin the big job of making sure the new Vet School is finished to welcome the 2010 Veterinary Science students.

Some roads have been closed for the construction works on the School of Veterinary Science Project. Also the speed limit for the outer ring road has dropped to 30km an hour.

Gatton Aquatic Centre – \$3 million has been received by the University to begin construction on the new campus pool. Architectus have been appointed as the Architects for the project. The decision has been made to demolish the grandstand but will be keeping the original hole. The new pools will be going into the original hole as it is heritage listed. Construction is set to begin during 2009.
