UQ Gatton's 2018 Gold Medal Awarded

In December 2018 agriculture and soil scientist Dr Glen Simpson was awarded The University of Queensland Gatton Gold Medal. The award is in recognition of his lifetime of work on improving the welfare of communities around the world.

The Gold Medal is awarded to a UQ Gatton graduate - or a graduate of its agricultural college predecessor - who has achieved outstanding success

Dr Simpson began his agricultural journey 61 years ago when, as a 12 year old, he became a boarder at UQ Gatton's predecessor, Queensland Agricultural High School and College.

He completed his schooling, a Queensland Diploma of Agriculture and further graduate and postgraduate studies at UQ.

"From there I travelled widely as a young graduate, and was increasingly determined to tackle poverty and hunger in disadvantaged communities," Dr Simpson said.

"My first real job was working as a United Nations adviser, setting up research programs and a soil laboratory in Spain, helping transfer Australian farming systems and research capabilities.

"I then did similar work in Thailand for the Australian Government, before working on innovative irrigation and drainage systems in Central America."

Following decades saw Dr Simpson work in international development, helping provide technologies and services in agriculture, health, education, land titling and justice and most recently in post-conflict reconstruction in war affected regions and countries.

Dr Simpson is delighted to have won the award, and to have his work recognised by his alma mater.

"It's a true honour to be presented with this award, from an institution that set me up with a well-rounded science and practical education.

"It's been a rewarding career, and I've been lucky to have had the opportunity to work with and get to know and understand people in the communities.

"But it's no time to stop, as we face big challenges, such as climate change, pollution, population growth, and food production, storage and distribution.

"This is an incredibly exciting time for agricultural scientists and producers and we must continue to collaborate internationally to put forward Australia's best and brightest ideas."

Distinguished Past Student Awards 2018

The UQ Gatton Distinguished Past Student Award recognizes the tremendous achievements of graduates of The University of Queensland Gatton or its former entities, *Queensland Agriculture College*, and the *Queensland Agricultural High School and College* are by any measure truly outstanding.

Since the inception of the award in 2010 there have been some 20 distinguished past students awarded this honour.

Bruce Mutch

Bruce attended the then Queensland Agricultural High School and College from 1950 to 1953. After leaving College, he first lived the dream of many a city-born GPS school student becoming a Jackaroo at Monto and later Roma.

He went on to become a Stock Agent, Cattle Husbandry Advisor, and Field Research Officer until he joined Rumevite in 1973, first as their National Technical Manager and later as Managing Director (aka Chief Executive Officer). Rumevite was the premium feed supplement for use on dry and green feed. It was the byproduct of the distillation of alcohol from molasses sold as the Rumevite Block.

In 1985 he joined Ridley Agricultural Products – Liquid Feed Division as National Technical Manager.

In 2000 he moved to Champion Liquid Feed Company (later Westway Feed Products) as National Technical Manager – then becoming Director until his retirement in 2009.

Bruce credits an introduction to ruminant nutrition by Neil Briton at the Queensland Agricultural High School and College as the stimulus that motivated him towards a career in animal nutrition.



Don Oxenham

Don attended the Queensland Agricultural High School and College, graduating with a Diploma in Animal Husbandry in 1958. He has managed to combine a career as a researcher in animal nutrition with a career as a rugby league official.

After graduation, Don took up a position with CSIRO at the Cooper Laboratory at Lawes, undertaking research as to the digestibility of tropical grasses and legumes, followed by the nitrogen nutrition of grass and grass/legume pastures with Dr. Ted Henzell.

He undertook a wide range of research projects and authored a number of publications before he left the CSIRO in 1982, after 22 years, to pursue his passion for rugby league.

A gifted rugby union and league player, Don played for the First 15 at the Queensland Agricultural High School and College and went on to play rugby league at Gatton Rugby League Club, Wests in Brisbane, representing Brisbane in the Trades and Labour Cup as well as the Police Team in the Public Service League.

Later he took on a variety of coaching and executive roles with various rugby league clubs.

In 1986 he joined the Queensland Rugby League as Coaching Director Brisbane Rugby League and later served on the Queensland Rugby League and Australian Rugby League Committees, dealing with coaching and development of rule changes.

Don has had 21 articles published in the "Rugby League Coaching Magazine".

Jack Steggall

Jack graduated from the former Queensland Agricultural College in 1977 with a Bachelor of Applied Science – Food Technology.

He started his career as a Dairy Technologist at Port Curtis Dairy in 1978 where his technical knowledge and proactive nature were soon making a positive contribution to the business. This was the start of a long and productive sales and technical development career in the dairy and related industries.

After 3½ years Jack moved to Grundy Thompson as a Technical Sales Representative followed by Marketing Manager with Bush Boake Allen.

Having gained practical knowledge and skills in the dairy supply industry, in 1992 Jack made a big step with wife Linda – starting their own business, Steggall Nutrition Pty Ltd.

Initially it was just Jack, Linda and one part-time employee but over the past 26 years Steggall Nutrition Pty Ltd has grown to be a very successful company with 45 staff (including eight Food Technologists – two thirds of whom are Gatton graduates) and a turnover of many millions of dollars per year.

Even with the long days dedicated to managing and growing Steggall Nutrition, Jack still found time to be the UQGPSA Honorary Treasurer from 2004 to 2008.




Three Distinguished Past Students Award recipients - Jack Steggall, Bruce Mutch and Don Oxenham

He formed the Fraser Island Defenders Organisation in 1971 and lobbied the Bejelke-Petersen Government to stop sand mining and logging on the island, eventually having it listed as a World Heritage Site in 1992. In 1976, he was announced as "The Australian" Newspaper Australian of the Year and in 1993 he received the internationally respected Goldman Environmental Award

John was awarded, in the 2014 Australia Day Honours, a Order of Australia and in 2017 he was bestowed with a Honorary Doctorate from the University of the Sunshine Coast. It is disappointing to note that of the many tributes to his life's work, no mention was seen of his QDA or UQ Gatton Gold Medal. John passed away 3 February 2019.

WATERS, Claire Eunice

John Guthrie Receives Life Membership of UQGPSA



At Back to College Weekend 2018 our Honorary Treasurer John Guthrie was presented with a Life Membership. John has received this as a token of our gratitude for his dedication to the Association, having taken on the responsibility for the Treasurer's role since joining the Committee

in 2008. His sound understanding of the stock market and investment strategies has ensured that our funds are being well managed.

John commenced study at QAC in 1966 in the last of the 3 year diploma course. He finished the QDAH in 1968 and began work at the College shortly after as a Field Assistant at the old dairy factory. In 1970 John started the tertiary course on a part-time basis while working both at the dairy factory and the new Food Studies building as a technician in Food Microbiology. In early 1979 he was put in charge of the new pilot plant at food studies. John graduated in Food Technology (BAppSc) in 1979 and after 10 years on the staff joined the DPI in Rockhampton. Rockhampton was where he was based for his career in the DPI. For the last 13 years of his paid working life he undertook research in applications of near infrared spectroscopy to assessing food quality (mainly intact fresh fruit) non-invasively and inline in 'real time'. During this period he was awarded both a Masters followed by a PhD in this area of science by the Central Queensland University.
