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Meet our 2020 scholarship recipient - Samantha Drummond

"I cannot begin to describe how grateful I am to be chosen for this award; it will help me immensely over the next five years."

Samantha is a second year student in Veterinary Science despite considering a number of other options before enrolling at Gatton. She always held hope that she could eventually do the first job she ever wanted as a young girl. She nearly changed her mind after seeing a veterinarian feeling the reproductive tract of a cow on TV. Samantha's attendance at Gatton required her to relocate as it was not practical to commute each day. Throughout her first year, she was constantly worried about

how she was going to afford accommodation in the Gatton area as she was not able to arrange other funding. Being awarded the UQ Gatton Past Students Association Scholarship for 2020 has given

her the chance to continue to live on campus and concentrate on her studies.

UQGPSA boosts fund in support of students at Gatton Campus

The Association has made a significant donation to expand the existing scholarship to support even more students.

A \$50,000 pledge (\$10,000 per year for five years) will be matched dollar for dollar by UQ's Create Change Scholarship Match; an initiative to add \$30 million in needs-based scholarships to UQ's endowment. Additionally another \$50,000 has been pledged by the School of Agriculture and Food Sciences. This will result in \$3 being deposited into the Scholarship Fund for every \$1 raised.

The scholarship was established in 2006 to support students of Gatton Campus who, because of financial, personal, or home circumstances, might otherwise be unable to enter full-time study at UQ Gatton. Fourteen students have been assisted since 2007 with a scholarship of \$5000 per year for the duration of their course. To date the total funds paid to the 14 students are \$220,000. Four scholarship recipients are currently at Gatton. Those on campus dined with the Management Committee and UQ representatives recently.

"This scholarship recognises the importance of ensuring students who are in financial distress can further their agricultural education at the Gatton Campus", says President of the Association, Mark Pace.

"We saw the need to enhance engagement with our Scholarship program and UQ's "Create Change" initiative has provided the ideal opportunity for the Association to collaborate closer with UQ and the Faculty of Science to provide meaningful opportunities for prospective students".

The \$50,000 pledge means students in need will have increased access to a world-class program for the duration of their undergraduate studies.

President's Report

Since March 2020, the world has taken a significant shift associated with the COVID-19 pandemic, which has impacted all of us and our way of life over the past months. I trust that all our members and their direct and extended families have endured safely wherever they may be.

Based on the seriousness of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Association decided to make one of its most difficult decisions ever and call off the 2020 Back to College Reunion. We can only hope that the situation will be much better in 2021 and we can host the BTCW with twice as much enthusiasm.

Despite the impact of the pandemic, the Management Committee have throughout the year continued to engage and progress various initiatives.

- Our existing UQGPSA Scholarship model is now aligned with the 'Create Change' initiative of The University of Queensland. This change maintains our Scholarship fund's charter and name but permits our fund to become eligible to receive matched funding via the University and the Faculty of Science. Our Association contributes \$50,000 and through a three to one arrangement this transforms into \$150,000 over the 5 years. This initiative ensures the UQGPSA Scholarship Fund continues to operate sustainably well into the future.
- Gatton Gold Medal Award is now in the final stages of repositioning from the Honorary Awards structure to the

University Alumni Awards Scheme structure. This move will assist in maintaining the prestigious award and enhance the Associations engagement in the process, timing and selection of the Award.

This year has also seen some personal and structural changes around the Gatton Campus.

- Retirement of the Campus Director Ms Janelle Zahmel after 16 years of service to the Faculty and the Gatton Campus and our formal thanks to her for her support over that time. See my short article included later in this issue.
- Professor Debbie Terri commenced as the new Vice Chancellor, in August this year replacing Professor Peter Høj after 7 years. Professor Terri is no stranger to UQ and we warmly welcome her back to UQ and to Gatton after her time as Vice Chancellor at Curtin University for 7 years. I met with Professor Terri at the Gatton Campus in late September to discuss the many developments with the UQGPSA. She expressed a great interest in the charter of the Association and the great achievements it is undertaking.
- · Completion of the new entry and the associated landscaping to the Gatton Campus. I would urge any past members to pay the Campus a visit and appreciate the wonderful new look of the Gatton Campus entry leading into the Avenue of Palms.

We have lost some very notable members and past staff members. In particular, a real stalwart of the Gatton Campus, Dr. Jim Galletly. See my article elsewhere in this edition.

I must also make mention of the UQGPSA Raffle which has been headed by one of the Management Committee members Mr. Adrian O'Connor. I would urge all members to investigate this raffle and to support it, as it ultimately supports our Association and the Scholarship fund and to ensure we can 'give back' and provide opportunities for those seeking an education in the Agricultural programs offered here at the Gatton Campus. Ms Akilah Dorris is a prominent figure in the progress against domestic violence in Guyana and its region. Working within the Guyanese government, Ms Dorris works, leads and advocates for the importance of women's empowerment, especially in the rural areas of Guyana.

UQ Gatton Graduate is an international leader against domestic violence

After previously working with vulnerable men, women and children in rural communities, Ms Dorris wanted to work within rural development to help those less fortunate in her community. Her hard work and impressive career now see her at the front line in preventing family violence in a society with a high incidence of domestic and sexual violence.

Ms Dorris currently holds the position of Manager in the Sexual Offences and Domestic Violence Policy Unit where she plays a leading role in coordinating resources across Guyana, including social workers, domestic violence survivors, and leaders at all levels of government. She engages with the community directly, by working with community organisations, and via the Guyanese media

in order to raise awareness and change community perceptions of domestic violence.

The Domestic Violence Unit was established in October 2016 with the view of reducing the high incidence of sexual and domestic violence in Guyana. Ms Dorris's office engages with ministries and non-government organisations to bring greater awareness to the issue of domestic violence in Guyana. Among many other initiatives, the unit developed a temporary assistance programme for domestic violence survivors, where they provide temporary accommodation for victims up to about six months until they can be reintegrated.

Ms Dorris studied at UQ Gatton, where she attained a Master of Rural Systems Management in 2012.

Farewell to Janelle

In September this year, long-serving UQ Gatton Campus Director, Ms Janelle Zahmel retired from the role she commenced in 2011 after the disestablishment of the then Faculty of Natural Resources, Agriculture and Veterinary Science (NRAVS). Prior to her role as Campus Director she performed the role of Faculty Executive Officer (FEO) of NRAVS from 2004 to 2010.

For the past 16 years, Janelle has been a strong advocate for the UQGPSA and has supported many of the initiatives the Association has fostered such as the Scholarship fund and Back to College Weekends to which she was a regular special guest. She also regularly attended our dinners with Scholarship recipients and attended specific Management Committee meetings over the years. Janelle was instrumental in ensuring the Association was provided with secure facilities in Morrison Hall and with the re-location of the Museum to its current position.

Strategically and operationally Janelle has been involved with most key developments associated with the Gatton Campus including the relocation of the School of Veterinary Science from St Lucia to Gatton around

2010, the redevelopment of the swimming pool and sports complex to the recent landscaping works and the Campus entry.

I have had the pleasure of working closely with Janelle for most of those 16 years and more specifically during my tenure as Director of UQ-GVEC under the Faculty of NRAVS in 2008 and then under the Office of the Director Gatton Campus (ODGC) and finally under the Faculty of Science since 2016.

Our Association wishes to thank Janelle for her long support and for which I had the privilege as President to award her a Plaque of Appreciation on behalf of the Association prior to her departure. We wish her well for her future plans.

Gatton College Stalwart Divines for the Final Time

Dr James Craig Galletly.

The name James Craig Galletly or Oigle would be known to most readers of Re-Connect as one of Gatton College's most enduring characters and is synonymous with other great Gatton College pillars such as Stan Petherick. Jim arrived at the College in 1943 and remained associated with the College for almost 75 years.

Jim sadly passed away on 5 June 2020 at the age of 92. He was well known in his later years for his untiring research and redefining of aquifer recharge in the Lockyer Valley. Jim's essential interest was always soil and water. Having observed the Lockyer Creek since 1943, and the irrigation water supply failures of the 70s/80s, he felt sure that there was a problem with the publicly accepted account of the Lockyer Valley aquifer recharge system.

He was passionate about the importance of verifying the principles of water recharge and the origins of base flow to permit better management associated with the extraction and distribution of water throughout the Valley. In 2008 at the age of 80, Jim completed his PhD in Water Hydrology and Aquifer Recharge of the Valley and was relentless in his pursuit of ensuring his research and subsequent findings, which challenged mainstream hydrology, were reviewed and evaluated.

I will include excerpts of an overview of Jim's life provided by another notable Gatton College lecturer, Dr Jeff Tullberg:

1943 was the start of a lifelong association with the College. Conditions were quite basic then with the main College buildings used as a US Army base hospital, but Jim excelled. He was Dux of his class each year, good at sports - boxing and cross-country- and also enjoyed the large practical component of college courses. Many years later, Jim recalled planting ten acres of opium poppies to supply the hospital with medicinal heroin! In 1946 he was one of only two students to win open scholarships to The University of Queensland, where, perhaps unsurprisingly, he chose agriculture. After struggling with the sciences of the first two years, he completed his degree in 1950.

Jim's B.Ag.Sci led to work as a soil conservationist with the Queensland Department of Agriculture and Stock, and he was sent to Pittsworth in 1951. There, he found soil conservation work with farmers thoroughly satisfying, laying out and supervising construction of over 150km of contour bank erosion protection systems – some Queensland's earliest. It was in Pittsworth where he met and married Lenor (nee Whittaker) in 1954. Jim rarely talked to colleagues about his personal life, but in later life he described his time in Pittsworth as "wonderful days."

Jim moved back to the Queensland Agricultural College at Gatton as Lecturer in Agronomy in 1955, expecting to specialise in soil conservation. Unfortunately staff deaths and losses resulted in Jim being the 'willing horse' who agreed to take on a huge range of subjects. Over 10 years of a new three-year diploma, these included Meteorology, Economic Geography, Soils, Surveying, Botany, Crop Agronomy, Tropical Agriculture, Rural Economics, Principles of Agronomy and History of Agriculture. as well as filling in in Plant Pathology and Chemistry. He also taught the sections of the UQ agriculture course In addition to Soil and Water Conservation (Field Engineering)! Despite this unreasonable load, he completed an external master's degree focused on soil/plant water relations in 1968.

Jim built one of the earliest rainfall simulators. in Queensland, based on designs seen in Israel. This and similar units were widely used to demonstrate the soil protection effects of crop residue and a valuable contribution to soil conservation extension effort of the 70s and 1980s. During this period Jim found great satisfaction in running a specialist suite of fourth-year subjects on Soil and Water Conservation for the QAC degree courses, and he maintained contact with several of those students for years after their graduation. Many went on to work in the Queensland Department of Primary Industries, and from the mid-1970s the majority of soil conservation field services staff had undertaken Jim's courses at Gatton.

He was also awarded the first of QAC's internally funded research grants, allowing a three-year investigation of irrigation water use on college properties. It was the period when overuse of the Lockyer Valley aquifers was becoming obvious, and many irrigation farmers were running dry, with dire financial consequences. Responding to this, Jim designed some of the first flood

harvesting systems, with ring tanks and cheap, high capacity, low head centrifugal pumps providing an alternative irrigation water supply. Many hundreds of these structures now make a major contribution to the productivity of the Darling Downs and Lockyer Valley.

Jim's long and productive life has touched many people and communities. It was a life of service – doing the thoughtful, right and generous thing: for family, students, employer, community, and the environment. He was one of Australia's greatest water champions and will be remembered as someone unafraid to speak his mind.

For those of us who knew him and worked with him or indeed were students of his, we all tip our hat to his legacy and express our thanks for someone who was often referred to as 'one of the good guys'.

Although Ken had grown up on a dairy farm, his first career wasn't in agriculture. However, with the development of the "Fellowship Diploma Course" he saw the potential for him to become an agricultural teacher.

Following graduation, Ken was appointed as an agronomist at Biloela Research Station, concentrating on safflower, lupins and guar but also doing some preliminary studies on guayule and niger. His PhD study determined the role of mycorrhiza in the phosphorus nutrition of guar in low P soils of the Central Queensland Highlands.

However, it was his transfer to Gatton Research Station that saw him make significant contributions to a number of what many would see as horticultural crops. At that time, potatoes, pumpkins, onions, sweetpotatoes and garlic were under the control of the Agricultural Branch within the DPI. Some of Ken's contributions, in conjunction with other staff were:

- Agronomic work with Atlantic potatoes that became a premium crisping potato,
- The development of Glenlarge and Southern Glen as premier short day garlic varieties,
- The release of Wollen Brown and White onion varieties.
- The development of Winlock for winter potato production,
- The introduction of the pink skinned Beauregard sweetpotato that became the premium variety,
- The development of the purple skinned sweetpotato variety Northern Star, and the development of the white skinned sweetpotato variety Kestrel.

Ken was also responsible for the first field testing in Australia of a genetically modified crop. This variety, developed by CSIRO, was a transgenic variety with leaf roll resistance. All of the protocols for future field testing of genetically modified crops in Australia were established during this trial work at Gatton Research Station.

With the formation of the Queensland Horticultural Institute, Ken was appointed as Program Leader for Vegetables involving the supervision of 70 staff spread from Mareeba to Stanthorpe. In 1999, he was appointed Acting Director of the Institute managing 350 staff and a \$25 million budget.

Despite retiring from the DPI in 2002, Ken has continued to be involved with it, particularly as the Chairman of Progression Panels for professional staff as well as a flood recovery extension officer following the 2011 floods in the Lockyer Valley.

Ken has also continued his involvement with UQ Gatton as a lecturer and tutor. He has lectured in the first year subjects Systems Management and Knowledge Management as well as doing special lectures in Horticulture and Agriculture. In 2014, Ken coworked with Dr Guta Bedane to review the past 30 years of research on 15 grain crops grown in the Northern Grain Belt, a region that stretches from Dubbo to Emerald.

He has also continued his involvement with the Australian Onion Industry as Chair of the Onion Industry Advisory Committee. In 2012, Ken was awarded the national Reg Millar Award in recognition of his outstanding service to the industry.

During his working life, Ken has also been involved in:

- A study tour to the USA looking at safflower, guar and guayule,
- Vegetable consultancies in Pakistan and Indonesia.
- Study tours to look at potatoes in South Africa
- Study tours to Asian markets in Singapore, Taiwan, Hong Kong and Japan (heavy vegetables) with two producers, and
- A trip to PNG to review an ACIAR project on sweetpotatoes.
- Successful supervision of 3 Masters and 3 PhD students and currently supervising another PhD student.

An OAM seems as justified reward for someone who has definitely applied the College motto "Science with Practice" to everything he has done for the benefit of agricultural industries.

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

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Introducing Stewart Bain

To borrow the title from the wonderful book by Albert Facey, I have had "a fortunate life" and thank God for it daily. My maternal grandfather came out from England to be a sugar chemist at Racecourse Mill Mackay. After a stint

in Bundaberg where my elder sister was born, my parents then moved to Brisbane. The plan for me after Gatton was to go dairying at Sandy Creek (Gympie District) for an aunt and her husband who had no son to take over their farm. That was hand milking jerseys, manual separating and taking cans of cream on the carryall of a Fergy TEA 20 down to the loading stage for the factory truck to pick up. School holidays were not holidays back then.

Upon graduation in 1968 however, I was offered a Company Cadetship with a grand old English family-run pastoral company. Australian Estates Qld Ltd of 100 Creek St, Brisbane was under the control of Sir Denys Lowson, a former Lord Mayor of London and was traditionally managed but surprisingly well diversified. In addition to their Woolstores on the Hamilton reach of the Brisbane River there was a strong Stock & Station Agency presence, Annual Race Horse Yearling Sales and a string of sheep and cattle properties running from the deep south up through Qld across the bottom of the Gulf of Carpentaria to the northern coast and our original family linked Sugar Mills.

Personal Highlights

1) I knew and often spoke with "Mother Watts" the wife of Kidman's legendary Queensland Pastoral Inspector Galloping Jack Watts and the Matriarch of the South West Queensland Watts' families. She was as down to earth as you could get. There was an historical story waiting to be told in each of the many photographs that surrounded the huge dining room table. "Tobermory" always was a welcome sight after a big day.



2) I knew and spoke to Kalkadoon warrior Sparrow Barton of the Argylla/Selwyn Ranges around Mt. Isa. I worked and was mates with his half-brother Alf. To this day I wish I had spent more time listening and learning more of their lore while in the bush with Alf.

I met a beautiful young woman from Springsure and so after I cleared the National Service hurdle without my number coming up, we decided to marry in December 1972. Later with a young and still growing family we chose the stability of a government job over the drought and flooding rains vagaries of the rural sector. A reliable man who could operate trucks and machinery and work in isolated areas was valued by the then PMG. later Telecom. still later Telstra. I was selected for an intensive 18 month Officer Training Course and that combined external technical extension courses has resulted in my Diplomas. However, they are not Agriculture related. For the next 30 years we transferred around the midwest and Nth Qld. whilst I worked on, estimated. inspected and designed communication network projects from the eastern Northern Territory through the Gulf Country & Islands, plus mine sites only to finish up (you guessed it) once again on the ancestrally linked Qld Sugar Coast. How things change but still remain the same.

Gatton was a godsend for me, I lived in Shelton Annex 1 my first year, then Annex 2 second year in charge of 15 or so first year students. I was also a Senior Cadet Platoon Commander and those responsibilities added to the then stiff college spirit of sticking with your House (Shelton of course) and team when the going gets tough, this helped me then and in later life. I always walk the area where those Annex buildings once stood when I return to campus, I can't help but look up to see if Mr Briton is standing in his garden still.

Having visited the Northern Hemisphere on one of our trips we can see now why my grandparents left Scotland/England and Beverley's grandparents left Ireland/Denmark for our warmer climate. We are retirees now and our children (3 girls & 1 boy) and 6 grandkids are off on their own life adventures.

Beverley is a quilter and at nearly 70 years I am the junior member of a Windmill & Machinery Restoration volunteer crew that renews rare exhibits for the Jondaryan Woolshed. We still use "Rosemount" for Horse Agistment and all 16 paddocks are named after native birds. All timber alive or dead is sacrosanct here, as nesting hollows do actually "grow on trees". Thank you for the opportunity to serve QAC. And finally, Gents don't ignore your prostate health, sitting on the problem won't fix it.
