Our guest speaker for the evening was Faculty of Science Executive Dean Professor Melissa Brown. Of special note were our three DPSA recipients and the awarding of our Honorary Membership to Dr Madeleine Hamon, who has been such a strong supporter of our Association over the years. She once again kindly donated \$10,000 to our UQGPSA Scholarship fund.

Our AGM was held on Saturday, 3 December with good numbers attending. ### Distinguished Past Students Awards 2022



### lan Buck

After his years at QAC (1966 – 1968) lan forged a unique career in Agribusiness, that he is still pursuing, and

that is directly related to his studies at QAC.

lan is a Senior Executive in Agribusiness, Banking and Finance in Australia with over 12 years experience in project scoping, implementation and management for Multilateral Development Banks, Government and Corporate agencies, working in the integrated rural development and private development sectors (see also back page).

After graduating from UQ St Lucia, Ian worked at the Department of Primary Industries Queensland Wheat Research Institute at Toowoomba as an Extension Officer before being contracted to the Solomon Island's Cattle Development Authority where he lived and worked for 6 years. This was the first of many South Pacific projects over his career. When he returned to Australia, Ian took up a shortterm contract in Alice Springs, scoping a project related to the Brucellosis and Tuberculosis Eradication Program.

His career turning point was in 1987 when he joined the Westpac Bank with a 12-month pilot program as a National Rural Advisor, initially based in Toowoomba. His brief was to help farmers facing financial difficulties. He worked closely with farmers, industry organisations and government agencies including the Qld DPI Farm Financial Counselling Service and the Rural Adjustment Authority. This led to establishment of a national Farm Debt Mediation Service.

lan went on to be appointed to several Rural Industry Task Forces and Primary Industry Ministerial Committees to assist with strategic planning and specific industry planning studies. From 1998 – 2004 Ian was a State Ambassador of Beef Australia and a director of Brian Pastures and Belmont Research Stations for 9 years.

Since 2014, Ian's work has focused on the PNG to South Pacific, Pacific Region. He lived and worked for 5 years in Samoa, until 2020, where he was contracted to the Asian Development Bank to implement and manage the pilot Samoa Agribusiness Support Project.



Ray Byrnes Ray graduated

from the Queensland Agricultural High School and College in 1952 with a

Queensland Diploma in Agriculture. From there he had a career in agriculture, local government politics and served in the Australian Citizen Military Forces.

Ray Byrnes was born in Atherton and raised on a dairy farm at Danbulla on the Atherton Tablelands. After graduating from Gatton College, he remained on campus, being employed at the College in the Poultry and Dairy Sections. A short time after that Ray took up a position with the Qld Department of Agriculture and Stock, otherwise known as the DPI, as a Cadet in the Poultry Branch. He worked at the DPI's Rocklea and Kairi Stations before being transferred to Brisbane to take up a Poultry Extension role.

The DPI saw the leadership potential in Ray because in 1972 they sent him on a study tour in New Zealand investigating poultry production facilities. In 1974 he ran a Poultry Industry Tour to New Zealand for their poultry producers and in 1976, an 11-week study tour to the USA, Canada and the UK.

Ray then commenced studies at UQ St Lucia, firstly to obtain a Bachelor of Science in (1966) and later a Master of Science (1979) after which he moved to QUT graduating in 1981 with a Graduate Diploma in Business Administration.

After 6 years as the DPI Pig and Poultry Industries Branch Director he once again headed overseas and presented a paper at the 5<sup>th</sup> World Conference on Animal Production in Japan. He went on to be appointed to a variety of senior positions with DPI up until his retirement to Yungaburra in Far North Queensland in 1993.

March 2000 saw Ray elected as a Councillor of the Eacham Shire Council. Later he became Deputy Mayor and in 2004, the Mayor. In 2007 Ray was Appointed Chair of the Transition Committee for Tableland Shires amalgamation and in 2008 he presided over the final Eacham Shire Council meeting held on the 13 March.

Ray has been involved in and still is in a wide range of Community Groups including Landcare, Water Groups and Reef Rescue Groups.

### Tim Neale

Since graduating from UQ Gatton in 1995 Tim has received a number of prestigious awards including:

- Australian Rural Consultant of the Year, 2018
- Pearcey ICT Entrepreneur of the Year (QLD), 2019
- Innovation and Technology Award (Toowoomba Chamber of Commerce), 2021

He is the co-founder of DataFarming, a digital agriculture platform which services over 30,000 farms across 50 countries with satellite imagery every 5 days. The platforms are adopted across the world and are used, and backed by, some of the largest agricultural companies in the world.

He has managed over 30 Industry Research Development and Extension projects for a broad spectrum of clients in grains, horticulture, cotton, viticulture, sugarcane, turf, and tree crops.

Tim served on the CRCSI Board (program 4), Society for Precision Ag Australia (SPAA) Committee, the National Positioning Infrastructure (NPI) advisory board, and is a foundational member of AusAgTech. He has delivered presentations to over 40 conferences including the first PA conference in South Africa and the World Congress on Conservation Agriculture in Canada.

Matt Norton in his letter of support for Tim's nomination said:

"I have the pleasure of having watched Tim's work since the inception of DataFarming in 2017. I see daily, the unbelievable outcomes he is achieving for agriculture and ag tech. Tim is widely regarded within agriculture as one of the leading voices fighting for the successful development and adoption of simple, easy to use technology. The data and technology available within agriculture is endless, yet the interpretation and application of this data to the farm-level decision-making processes is less common."

"Tim's early career experience as an extension agronomist means he has an intrinsic understanding of farmers and agronomists. This has allowed him to perfectly tailor his ag tech for maximum adoption and ease of use. Tim is trusted. His opinions are regularly sought by industry bodies and media outlets to make sure they get accurate, unbiased, and honest insight into agriculture and ag tech in Australia."

## Help us celebrate 60 years of hockey at Gatton Campus

Frank Natoli, in his family memoir, includes his role in the initiation of Hockey at QAC. Frank remembers that he was approached by Gary Ham in early 1963 to form a hockey club. Gary was a third year UQ Agricultural Science student studying (as was normal in their 3<sup>rd</sup> year) at QAC. He was a prominent member of the UQ club and wanted the sport to be introduced to QAC. Frank describes a very complex process to get the permission from the then Principal, Mr Briton and to gain admission to the Toowoomba Hockey Association. He spent many hours on this task including getting a field to play on, having goal posts made, arranging the uniform, oh and some people to play and be the coach.

In the first year in the Toowoomba competition the college fielded 3 teams. Transport to the games was in a truck with bench seats back to back (but not secured). Students placed their feet on the side walls of the tray of the truck to hold the seats in place. The Reserve Grade team won the competition (H Scotney Trophy). Of course the issues with students being on holidays and having to forfeit games was present right from the start as mentioned in the extended report in the 1963 magazine. Frank sums up his seven years with the hockey club like this: "Although it was tiresome at times, I enjoyed seeing a group of individuals at the start of the season develop into a cohesive team at the end. They had their success and learnt to accept their losses, but overall they were developing skills and exercising. My reward was to come years later when speaking with old boys at reunions. There were many, including overseas students, who made representative teams in their postcollege years and many others who continued playing the game well into their forties. Many of them were very thankful that they had been given the opportunity to develop their skills during their time at the college."

I was encouraged (read roped into) to join hockey in my first years at QAC by some friends who were playing. Little did I know what was required to get the club started and how the history stretched back to the year I was born! I recall the very cold days in a short skirt sitting out in the weather because I was too young to gain entrance into the heated bar area. The trips up and back in the Grey Nurse were also memorable.

### **In Memoriam** Jim Kearnan 1937–2022

Since 1855, Stock Inspectors have been the mainstay behind Queensland's animal health system. We were saddened to hear that a true legend amongst this group passed away on 23 February 2022. Jim Kearnan was a 'larger than life' character who was extremely influential, committed to his chosen field and incredibly generous with his time and friendship. His unique sense of humour made spending time with Jim one of life's pleasures.

Jim was born on 20 June 1937 in Taroom. The eldest of four, he attended school in Taroom before going to Gatton Agricultural College for Junior studies and further education. He graduated with a Diploma in Animal Husbandry in 1956. Jim was very athletic and competed in athletics, boxing, cricket, tennis and rugby. His college Honour Blazer, emblazoned with sporting achievements, is now in our Museum.

His first posting as a Stock Inspector, with the then Department of Agriculture and Stock, was Toowoomba. He transferred to Roma in 1958, where he met his future wife Margaret, Mt Isa/Lake Nash (1959), a short stint in Brisbane before being posted to Laidley in 1961. Cattle ticks resistant to all then available chemicals were discovered in the Brisbane Valley in the mid 1960s. To prevent this 'Biarra' strain of tick from spreading, a stringent eradication program was implemented, which was established and supervised by Jim. He spent lengthy periods away from home at Toogoolawah, Beaudesert and Esk supervising up to a dozen staff.

Further discoveries of resistant ticks throughout Southeast Queensland saw Jim appointed as specialist extension officer in 1968. He worked with researchers from CSIRO to develop appropriate tick control programs, which he disseminated to producers through a variety of extension methods. At the Brisbane Exhibition, Jim supervised the movement of all livestock and used this opportunity to liaise with producers.

Jim was subsequently appointed as Manager, Cattle Tick Program for the State overseeing the movement of stock between the tick infected and free areas, which often lead to disputes. Jim's exceptional interpersonal skills excelled in resolving these issues. Jim was also the Queensland representative on the NSW Cattle Tick Advisory Committee.

In 1979, Jim transferred to Brisbane as head stock inspector and in 1989, was appointed Executive Officer for Veterinary Services Branch. In this latter role, Jim had a variety of duties, including assisting with strategic planning, which was vital as the tuberculosis eradication campaign wound down. However,



throughout this time he is best remembered for his guidance and wisdom in personnel management. He was confidant, mentor and father figure to a generation of stock inspectors.

A key attribute that endeared Jim to people across the agricultural industries was his unique sense of humour. There were myriad stories about, created or told by Jim. His humour was always gentle and his beloved practical jokes were never hurtful or belittling. The stories were generally characterised by Jim starting to giggle well before the punchline arrived.

Jim retired in December 1992, with one of the largest gatherings the Department had seen, moved to Caloundra and later Highfields where he continued his private loves of growing veges, cooking, wine appreciation and entertaining friends and ex-colleagues. He also loved British history and travel.

lan was raised on the family farm at Beerburrum in the Glasshouse Mountains region, and attended QAC from 1966 through to 1969. This period at QAC instilled in lan a passion for agriculture, however, unbeknown to him back then, his journey would take him along several career paths, all connected to agribusiness.

On leaving QAC, and following his passion to working in the beef sector, Ian gained employment as a Jackeroo in the Roma district. He later managed his family farm for several years, following which he attended the University of Queensland, St Lucia, to study for a Bachelor of Agricultural Science Degree. On gaining his degree, majoring in animal production, he was engaged as an extension officer with the Qld DPI, based at the Qld Wheat Research Institute in Toowoomba.

An opportunity to work in rural project management on private sector development projects, saw him contracted as Cattle Development Officer working on an Asian Development Bank funded project for the Western Province of the Solomon Islands, for 3.5 years, and followed this with a further 3 years as National Livestock Development Specialist based in Honiara, Solomon Islands. While working in the Solomons, lan undertook post-graduate studies in Agricultural Economics at the University of New England, which he completed in 1985.

On his return to Australia, he was employed under contract by Westpac as National Rural Adviser during a period of significant socio-economic stress in farming, as a result of high interest rates, drought and falling land values. He received a national Westpac Innovation award for this work in developing risk management performance indicators for lending to the rural sector. Ian was offered permanent employment with Westpac, which led to what he refers as his accidental career in the banking sector as an agribusiness specialist, and a 16-year career progressing to State Manager Agribusiness for Qld and NT.

His interest in agriculture as a serious business, led to further study. A Diploma from the Australian Institute of Company Directors followed. During his banking career he held many external roles with industry bodies, including 9 years as director of Brian Pastures and Belmont Research Station. Ian became an advocate for succession planning for farming families, which led to a change in career and 9 years as a Senior Financial Consultant, specialising in providing tailored specialist advice to rural and regional clients.

He commenced private consulting in 2012 and provides a diverse range of services to the Small to Medium Enterprise (SME) sector.
